# Pastoral Letter



# **Greetings!**

As you will no doubt be aware I have recently been appointed as the new locum minister to Dalserf Parish, so it gives me immense pleasure to say 'Hello' to you and send my good wishes. I am really excited and very much looking forward to getting to know everyone, and to continue worshipping God with the gathered congregation as others have done before me. In my 'official' capacity I will be with Dalserf one day per week plus a Sunday from Easter Sunday.

Accordingly, I would like to take this opportunity to introduce myself. I have been married to Tom for almost 30 years and we have one son, David, who lives in Larkhall with his partner Beth. Tom is a Maths and Physics teacher, teaching locally, and when I am not ministering, I work as an Accountant; I am finance director for two sister companies – one based in Blantyre and the other in The Netherlands.

I was ordained by the Church of Scotland as an Ordained Local Minister of Word and Sacrament in October 2020 during lockdown, after a training journey of almost six years starting from enquiry through to ordination and graduation. I did my training alongside my full-time job as well as undertaking my theology degree, also part-time, with Highland Theological College which is part of the University of the Highlands & Islands. That said, I believe my training for the ministry has been a life-time journey and not just one of six years, as there has never been a time in my life where church has never played a part.

I was Baptised at six weeks old and the rest they say is history. I went through Sunday School, Bible Class and onto becoming a Sunday School teacher. I went through Brownies, Guides, became a young leader and continued through the ranks to Guide Captain. I was a member of the Deacon Court for many years, and before my ordination, an Elder of the Kirk for 25 years, serving on various committees. I was church treasurer; I sang in the church choir, and with my friend Anne, was one of the founder members of the community choir, St John's Singers; Tom and I started a Saturday night youth club which ran successfully for many years; and additionally, I trained and volunteered as a bereavement counsellor with Cruse, a role I 'enjoyed' for many years.

I felt 'called' to ministry for quite a few years, but like many ministers will tell you, you put it off and say 'not me'.... but God had other ideas and persisted in calling. It was only when I had to put down on paper what my involvement in church had been over the years, that I realised that God had presented many opportunities and experiences, and had led me to places for a reason... to taste, to see, and to experience, so that I would have the necessary tools in my kit-bag to feel confident enough to fulfil the role He was calling me to do.

My home church is St John's in Hamilton, where Rev Bob Kent was my minister, and a huge influence, for 30 years. The first placement in my training, known as Discernment, was at Bellshill West with Rev Calum Stark; followed by Strathaven Rankin I/w Chapelton with Rev Dr Shaw Paterson; then it was on to St Mary's in Motherwell with Rev Bryce Calder; and my probationary period was with Rev Anne Paton at East Kilbride Old. During my first placement in Strathaven, the linked charge was going through a four-way union, following the retirement of Rev Bill Stewart from Strathaven East. This meant that at the end of my placement, Strathaven Trinity was 'born', culminating in the closure of Strathaven East, with the formation of a union between Strathaven East, Strathaven Rankin, as well as the parishes of Glassford and Chapelton, resulting in a 'new' charge comprising three places of worship: Strathaven, Glassford and Chapelton with one minister serving all three. As such, following the end of my placement I was asked to stay on and help out... which I did... and what an experience it was for a first-year student... getting the opportunity to lead worship every week, sometimes taking two and sometimes even three services back-to-back. It was a fantastic opportunity, and I am so grateful to Shaw for trusting me and giving me the autonomy to get on with it.



# Pastoral Letter

After ordination it came time for me to be placed as an assistant minister and I was asked if I would like to go back to Strathaven Trinity, which I was, and I have been fortunate to have been there for the last three years. It was great being back amongst people I knew, and again being given the trust and autonomy to get on with it.

Since my ordination, I've conducted weddings, funerals, and Baptisms; I've had a short spell of acting as interim moderator in Carluke; and last year I led worship at a Conventicle, braving the elements of the weather in an open field in Douglas Village – a first for me – but I must have done ok, as I've been asked back to conduct this years' service too, again in Douglas on 14<sup>th</sup> May...all welcome! I've also preached in prison, where I previously worked for five years; I led a Christmas Eve service in Dungavel House Removal Centre, as I hold Home Office clearance, and I had the privilege of leading worship in William Pouchie Memorial Presbyterian Church in Grand Cayman, The Caribbean, a couple of years ago. Grand Cayman is our 'go to' holiday destination, and we love to worship in that wee whitewashed church overlooking the ocean each week when we visit the island.

- Hobbies I like walking, reading, eating out, and when I visit the Caribbean, scuba-diving.
- My favourite tipple is black coffee.
- My favourite food is probably chicken... but I do love Tom's Spaghetti Bolognese.
- My favourite colour is blue.
- Sandwiches I'm one of these awkward people who doesn't take butter, marg, or mayo... and I don't like cream cakes either.
- I love hymn singing.
- I enjoy meeting new people.

As a minister it's a real privilege to be beside people in their grief, as well as in happier times too and at this moment in time as I pen this pastoral letter, I have two weddings to look forward to – one at the end of April at a venue in Glasgow, but the other, here in Dalserf Church in September. I am also looking forward to the Coronation Afternoon Tea as well as the Saturday afternoon teas & coffees.

At the end of March, I was invited along to the annual Girls Brigade closing award and presentation evening, to give a wee talk to the girls and their families. It was a great night, and let's just say we had a great evening, a good laugh, and a lovely cup of tea with home-baking. It was also a real surprise and an honour for me being presented with a GB chaplain's badge, and an invite to be their chaplain – a role I very much look forward to fulfilling when the company resume after the summer break.

Please be assured I will try to get to know you as quickly as I can, but if I don't recognise you, please, please stop me and introduce yourself. If you haven't been back to church in a while, then the Spring/Summer months are a great time to come back, especially as the better weather 'should be' on its way. However, the weekly service is recorded, and we aim to get it onto the church website within a few days, so please do join us that way too... feedback and favourite hymn suggestions are always welcomed.

I'll sign off just now with every blessing to you and yours and I hope to get to meet you soon.

## 1. Lectionary

I follow the prescribed Lectionary Scripture passages each week and will be using one or two of them as the basis for my sermon; I often use the prescribed Psalm as a call to worship. For those who may wish to read the passages in advance of the service, here is the list for month:

May 7<sup>th</sup> – Acts 7:55-60; Psalm 31:1-5 & 15-16; Psalm 119:9-32; 1 Peter 2:2-10; St John 14:1-14

May 14<sup>th</sup> – Acts 17:22-31; Psalm 66:8-20; Ezekiel 43:1-7a; Psalm 115; 1 Peter 3:13-22; St John 14:15-21

May 21<sup>st</sup> - Acts 1:6-14; Psalm 68:1-10 & 32-35; Isaiah 45:1-7; Psalm 1:1-7; 1 Peter 4:12-14 & 5:6-11; St John 17:1-11

May 28<sup>th</sup> – Acts 2:1-21; Numbers 11:24-30; Psalm 104:24-34 & 35b; 1 Corinthians 12:3b-13; St John 20:19-23; St John 7:37-3

#### 2. Church Choir

In a conversation with Phillip our organist, I understand that there used to be a church choir. Phillip is open to re-igniting this for anyone who would like to form a choir. The purpose of this would be to rehearse the praise songs for each week and be able to lead the singing, particularly where one of the hymns is perhaps less known, and also to, on occasion, perhaps sing an introit. The choir would meet in Hamilton Hall each Sunday before the service at a time to be agreed. If this is something that is of interest to you, then please either speak to me or Phillip.

# 3. Updated Mission Praise

We are grateful to Laura Fleming and East Kilbride West Kirk for kindly donating to us 50 copies of the most recent edition of Mission Praise. This will open up to us a wealth of new hymns and choruses to sing and learn.

# 4. Favourite hymns?

If anyone has a favourite hymn or chorus that they would like us to sing on a Sunday, then please let me know and I will try to incorporate it in a forthcoming service.

#### 5. Conventicle

As I mentioned in my letter, I am conducting openair worship in Douglas on 14<sup>th</sup> May at 2pm...all welcome. The venue is in a field in front of the Cameronian's Regimental Memorial. Last year there were circa 100+ people who gathered to worship.

#### 6. Bible Study

I'm hoping to start a Bible Study and am 'open' to when that should take place i.e. morning; evening; or perhaps even both, thus allowing folks who either work or having 'caring duties' during the day to attend; I guess it all depends on numbers. I see it taking the format of looking at a passage; having a chat about it; then having a blether over a cup of tea...and taking the opportunity to get to know each other a wee bit better. This is something I would like to kick-off pretty quickly, so if you are interested, please let me know your preference for day/evening.

One of my hopes, perhaps starting after the summer, is to run a 6-week course based on the film/musical/book 'Les Misérables'. The idea would be for us to watch the movie on week-1, thereafter meet over the next six weeks to discuss things that include: love, poverty, injustice, grace, hope etc referring to Biblical passages. Then, after we've studied the various topics, meet to watch the movie again, to see if we view it differently. The course was written by Rev Matt Rawle from the USA; I'm almost finished reading the leader's book and it looks pretty good...as well as being a wee bit different...and I'll happily bring the popcorn for the movie night!

## 7. Good news to share?

If anyone has good news to share e.g. a birthday, anniversary, special event, wedding/baby family news, then please let me know before a Sunday so that I can share it with the congregation. It's always great to be able to share happy news!

# 8. Church day

My mid-week day off is most likely to be a Wednesday. There is 'some degree' of flexibility around this but as I said in my letter, as well as ministry, I also work full-time. I am grateful that my company allow me to work condensed hours, thus allowing me a day off mid-week. The day can be flexible to a point, but my department is more fully staffed on a Wednesday hence it's easier to take that day off, so the Bible Study class is likely to be on a Wednesday. However, for pastoral work (funerals etc) this will be worked around to suit families' needs etc.
