And going out about the third hour he saw others standing idle in the market place; and to them he said, 'You go into the vineyard too, and whatever is right I will give you.' So they went. Going out again about the sixth hour and the ninth hour, he did the same. And about the eleventh hour he went out and found others standing; and he said to them, 'Why do you stand here idle all day?' They said to him, 'Because no one has hired us.' He said to them, 'You go into the vineyard too.' And when evening came, the owner of the vineyard said to his steward, 'Call the laborers and pay them their wages, beginning with the last, up to the first.' And when those hired about the eleventh hour came, each of them received a denarius.

Now when the first came, they thought they would receive more; but each of them also received a denarius. And on receiving it they grumbled at the householder, saying, 'These last worked only one hour, and you have made them equal to us who have borne the burden of the day and the scorching heat.' But he replied to one of them, 'Friend, I am doing you no wrong; did you not agree with me for a denarius? Take what belongs to you, and go; I choose to give to this last as I give to you. Am I not allowed to do what I choose with what belongs to me? Or do you begrudge my generosity?' So the last will be first, and the first last.

Pastoral Letter



Greetings

- ¹ I lift my eyes to the mountains where does my help come from?
- ² My help comes from the LORD, the Maker of heaven and earth.
- ³ He will not let your foot slip He who watches over you will not slumber;
- ⁴ indeed, He who watches over Israel will neither slumber nor sleep.
- ⁵ The LORD watches over you the LORD is your shade at your right hand;
- ⁶ the sun will not harm you by day, nor the moon by night.
- ⁷ The LORD will keep you from all harm He will watch over your life;
- 8 The LORD will watch over your coming and going both now and forevermore. [Psalm 121]

I have often narrated Psalm 121 as one of the Scripture passages at funerals, posing the question: Where will my help come from? With the answer being: My help comes from The Lord, the Maker of Heaven and Earth. The Psalmist presents these assuring words as our hope; our hope that God is watching over us and protecting us, whether than be during a period of grief; moving from Primary to High School; moving from High School to work, or college, or university; or any other period where we need assurance that we are not on our own and that God is always with us - as He promised He would be. So, as we start a new session for school, church organisations, etc, let the words of Psalm 121 be your hope for whatever situation you find yourself in. There are actually around 25 passages in the Bible whereby we are assured that God will never leave us nor forsake us. This is our hope. This is good news indeed. This is good news which we must share.

Global Living: having a positive impact on national and global environmental justice concerns.

Treasurer 🧬

When I became an elder some 51 years ago I was a member of a men's club that met in the Cartland Bridge Hotel every fortnight for an evening meal of two courses plus coffee.

One night the management informed us that they were raising the cost of the meal from seven shillings and sixpence (37,1/2p) to ten shillings (50p). We complained to the hotel that such an increase was unreasonable and that they were profiteering!! At that time one could buy a new bungalow for £3,500.

I relate this tale to emphasise the ravages that inflation, over a period of time, can have on a currency and one's personal savings. I need not remind members that the British nation has undergone a severe spike in inflation, and prices, in general, have risen accordingly. Electricity, gas and oil have all rocketed. The pulpit supply fee rose by 66% in June of this year, and increases in minister's salaries have been forecast.

Many members have been scrupulous in adjusting their offerings as the years have gone by, whilst some, perhaps including myself have been less so. May I remind members that Dalserf Church is still under threat of closure. To avoid that the church has to demonstrate that it is self financing, and will not prove to be a burden on the National Church in the future.

In stark figures, our church will have to generate in excess of £80,000 in 2023. That figure was just reached last year, only by the inclusion of £20,000 of investment income. Our offerings alone fall well short!!
