'Yakisuigi'...that's the word that Wull Armstrong, of "Wull's Wood" in Carluke, was looking for to describe the burnishing on the beautiful wooden cross which was dedicated in church at the end of October. Yakisuigi, is the Japanese method of preserving wood by lightly charring the surface and then treating it with oil, and our wooden cross for the Reflection Garden that Wull crafted and kindly donated to us, has been finished this way. As well as preserving the wood, all the beautiful graining has been highlighted. I think everyone will agree that it looks beautiful and will hopefully be a real feature in the Reflection Garden, bringing solace to those who sit and reflect.

As far as the garden is concerned we are due to receive the delivery of plants/bushes etc from the Woodland Trust mid-November; bulbs have been planted; the broken fence is due to be fixed, also mid-November and the cross is due to be in place towards the end of the month. Therefore, hopefully it won't be too long before you see the transformation.

This reminded me of the verse from 1 Corinthians Chapter 3 verse 13 which says,

...the fire will test the quality of each person's work.

This verse comes in a chapter where Paul is being pretty blunt to the church. In fact, in the first verse he says:

Brothers and sisters, I could not address you as people who live by the Spirit, but as people who are still worldly—mere infants in Christ.

You see, the Church were arguing about who they followed, Paul or Apollos. They had lost sight of the fact that the church is a community of people who are centred around Jesus, not a human leader.

Paul uses a farming metaphor.

I [Paul] planted the seed, Apollos watered it, but God has been making it grow.

This is an analogy that I use regularly, encouraging everyone of their role to spread the Good News of The Gospel. However, it's not about the messenger...it's about the message. Yes, it is our job to pass on the Good News, but we are not in control of what happens next, it's the Holy Spirit that works in and through other people's lives.

Paul then uses a building analogy where he says:

For no one can lay any foundation other than the one already laid, which is Jesus Christ.

The work we do as a church, both as leaders and as individuals must have Christ at its foundation, especially if we want to grow the Church here in Dalserf and around the country. If we remember this, then hopefully when our work is tested with 'fire', just like Yakisuigi, it is not destroyed... but it brings out the beauty of the grain.





On November 11th we hosted the Guild Christmas Fair, and what a busy time we had! However, everyone's hard work and efforts paid off, and the fantastic sum of was £2,314 was raised, which will be distributed amongst local charities, as well as national Guild chosen charities. It was also great to see Hamilton Hall once again so busy with familiar faces, enjoying fellowship over tea, coffee and home-baking.

The following day we had Remembrance Sunday with short memorial services at Netherburn and Ashgill, followed by our main service in Dalserf. It was lovely to see the Girls Brigade at all of these services and especially to have them sing in church. Thanks, must also go to Elaine Smith who played the Trumpet; our church Piper, Ross Forrest; our church soloist, Hazel Blair; our church 'pop-up' choir; and last but not least Kieran Hunter our organist.

As I compose this letter, we are waiting on the Rev David Coleman the "eco-congregation" chaplain coming to lead our service here at Dalserf. I am sure we will be challenged both individually and as a congregation to consider how we care for this beautiful planet that God has blessed us with and to think about the people we share it with.

At the beginning of this month I had the honour of Baptising Stuart Eathorne, who recently celebrated his 80th birthday. It was a special day, and after his Baptism, Stuart professed his faith and became a fully communicant member. However, we will celebrate two more professions of faith this month – Tom Carson on 19th November and Karyn Scotland on 26th. Together with these three professions, and the recent transfers of membership, we have welcomed **fifteen** new members to our congregational role since August. It is really encouraging to see our congregation grow, when other churches are faced with falling numbers.

I'm hoping that you have all '***saved the date***' for our first, and what hopefully will be an annual, Christmas Carol Concert? Saturday 16th December is the date, with a 2.00 for 2.30 start, when we will have several guest artists coming along to perform and entertain...our choir will be singing... hopefully the Girls Brigade will join us again...you will also get the opportunity to sing some of your favourite carols...and after you've enjoyed a cup of tea and a mince-pie, you will leave with the Spirit of Christmas in your heart, so why not take some time out of your busy Christmas schedule to come along and savour a musical treat and a time to worship in song.

We will be having a Watchnight Service on Christmas Eve and new this year will be a Christmas Morning Service at the earlier time of 10.30am. I would love to share Christmas morning with you here at Dalserf...but we will also be live-streaming the service, so if you can't make it along, we will bring the service to you.

So, as we approach Christmas why not give the people you meet a special Christmas gift...tell them about why we celebrate Christmas...plant for them that little seed... and let the Holy Spirit nurture it and help it to grow.

In her final days in Royal Deeside, the Queen posed a question that will resonate with every Scot. Looking out of the window of Balmoral Castle towards the river and the mountain peaks beyond, she queried, "Who would not want to be here?"

Sheena and I have just returned from an amazing short break in the North West of Scotland near Ullapool. That was the wonderful week when the sun shone from dawn to dusk with commensurate temperatures. Despite many similar holidays over my lifetime I have never witnessed such a dramatic landscape in such magnificent conditions. Such is my personal love of the mountains and the lochs, I must have "Highlander" genes in my bloodstream. To describe the scenery as "awesome" is to belittle it in a grand manner. My heart and soul were moved by the sight and I rejoiced in such grandeur. As I stared at their magnificence I could not help but feel my own smallness and insignificance. Compared to them I was a mere speck of dust. I was reminded of the saying in Psalm 8: "What is man that You are mindful of him?" The mountains, glens and lochs reminded me of God's almighty power, yet, as the Psalm says, "He made us a little lower than the heavenly beings". We are not insignificant in His sight. The skyline, filled with towering mountains, reminded me of God's infinite strength. The deep blue waters of the lochs reminded me of the depth of God's love for the human race.

Modern life seems to instil in us that humans are in charge and in control. Reflecting on the might of creation and the sheer majesty of the landscape certainly brings one "down to earth". Those hours of solitude, well away from the "madding crowd" lent themselves to contemplation of life, and, now that I'm eighty, my own mortality.

On this journey I visited a cousin that I had not seen for some time, in her home in the village of Comrie, near Crieff, and found to my amazement that she had just celebrated her hundredth birthday. Although somewhat less than agile, she still lives on her own and is mentally very sharp, and she drove her car till she was ninety three. Sheena and I have looked after another cousin of mine for six years since she was diagnosed with severe dementia at the age of eighty. That lady, in sharp contrast, has to stay in a care home with 24 hour attention. She has no recollection of "anything". There is no conversation, only the constant repetitive whisper "I don't know what I'm doing, I don't know what I'm doing, I don't know what I'm doing." To me her life ended years ago, and yet here she is struggling to face another day. I could not help but compare the two, as I had seen them only days apart. The 100 year old was a "normal" church goer. The second dedicated her life to her Lord, and served as a teaching missionary, under the Church of Scotland, for most of her life in the remote countryside of Nigeria, witnessing and suffering under civil wars and unrest.

God says "My ways are not your ways," but with such a close personal relationship to those two ladies, I cannot help but question the Lord's logic in these matters. I have to realise though that my thoughts are not his thoughts, and my plans are not His plans. I personally thank God for my parents, my siblings, my upbringing, my education, my job, the lady who agreed to be my wife, my own family, my good health, my church and my faith.

However as I contemplate my own mortality. I feel certain and accept that when He decides to call me home, He will decide when I take my final breath, and He will decide on the last beat of my heart.

Greetings from Kieran

From a small village in rural Dumfries and Galloway to living and working in Central Scotland, at 26 years old my life has already been a rich tapestry of experiences that have been richly enhanced by the people I have been fortunate to be mentored and supported by along the way.

I grew up in a village called Eastriggs in Dumfries and Galloway, roughly 3 miles from the English border, brought up by only my mother in a small council house loving very much on the breadline. Music was never to be the career-destination for me... I originally wanted to study politics and international relations! But a period of work experience in my secondary school music department ignited a passion for music that I could not ignore. From that moment, I worked tirelessly to improve my singing and piano skills with the aspiration of studying music at university. In coming from a very low-income household, affording music lessons was not on the cards but to the rescue came my standard grade music teacher, Mr Scott. Donald Scott, the man who I owe my entire career to, gave me a weekly piano on a Tuesday lunchtime and I quickly improved my skills to get to where I wanted to be... the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland.

In 2015, I received an unconditional offer to study the BEd Music degree at the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland. For four years I studied voice, piano, keyboard harmony and education studies. My singing teacher, Iain Paton, and piano teacher, Bingbing Li, further nurtured my passion for music and performing. During the summer holidays, I had occasional organ lessons with Edward Taylor, Assistant Organist of Carlisle Cathedral, where I learned to love the organ. I took my newfound passion for liturgical music to St Mary's Episcopal Cathedral in Glasgow where I sang in the choir for six years under the direction of Friikki Walker. Friikki's passion and expertise was second to none outstanding and inspirational. His teaching, whether direct or indirect, has shaped my understanding of choir training and liturgical music so positively. Through this, I have been fortunate enough to sing in Portsmouth, Lincoln and Manchester Cathedrals.

Since 2019, I have worked as a music teacher at Coatbridge High School. I absolutely adore working at this school and working with the young people there. Since 2022, I have worked as the Principal Teacher of Employability, working tirelessly to ensure all young people achieve a positive post-school destination. Additionally, I musically direct the annual school show, facilitate numerous musical events throughout the year, and actively involve myself in the wider school life to ensure each young person receives the highest quality of education provision possible. Further to my work at Coatbridge High, I also work with the SQA as an appointee. Each year I undertake marking duties as a visiting assessor, visiting schools to assess pupils at National 5 and Higher level for practical performances. I also mark the National 5 listening exam each year and, for the first time this year, I have undertaken the duties of 'Assessment Validator' for National 5 music where I quality assure the upcoming listening exam for the current exam year. I simply adore my job and would not have it any other way!

Then we come to Dalserf... I only came for a week to help out stating very clearly to Fiona on the phone, "I don't want a regular commitment!" but I was so overwhelmed with the welcome I received, and the breath of fresh air Fiona breathes into your typical presbyterian worship that I have never been away since and don't intend on going anywhere any time soon! I hope that my enthusiasm for music will help to enhance the fantastic worship that Fiona brings to Dalserf.

Outside of work and music I love to go travelling. My partner, Jordan, and I love going on holiday. Being together for nearly three years we have shared our many interests with each other. Jordan now adores going to the theatre to watch a musical, something he wouldn't have dreamed of before meeting me. I now love travelling and going on holiday, something I'd never been able to afford before becoming a teacher. So far, we have visited Turkey (twice!), Gran Canaria and Spain... where next!? Jordan is my rock. My soulmate. The one who continually supports and challenges me. I am so fortunate to be supported by someone so caring.

Well... that's me. I am very much a 'take me as you see me' person.
I will be very well turned out one week, then playing organ in my shorts the next.
As the famous goes "I am what I am!". I've survived 26 years living by it so far.....
here's to the next 26!

Their reference is often in a somewhat derogatory tone as if Dalserf was somewhat inferior to them.

I try to respond that the fact that we are a gathered church indicates that we are very much a Missional Church and the fact that members go out their way each Sunday to come to Dalserf indicates a strong and committed membership. The fact that Dalserf has survived in its present position for over 350 years indicates that being a gathered church is one of our strengths. Our regular attendance is the envy of many a "local" church.

I have speculated why this is the case. We sit in a special position in the heart of the attractive Clyde Valley, overlooking the fertile fields of the Dalserf "haugh" and the treelined valley escarpment. We are close to the lovely village of Rosebank and Dalserf Village is a delight in itself. Our appearance is like a picture postcard from another time, full of echoes of times gone by. This quiet pastoral and rustic place that offers a serene existence, in contact with a landscape and surroundings that have remained faithful to a way of life typical of rural Scotland many years ago, and in the hospitable nature of its people.
