Pastoral Letter





The song, 'Unchained Melody' by the Righteous Brothers, contains the following two lines 'And time goes by so slowly,' followed by, 'And time can do so much.' The first line I struggle with, but I agree whole-heartedly with the second.

The reason I struggle with the first is due to the fact that by the time this magazine goes out, I'll have been with you at Dalserf for one year, and it's certainly been anything but slow! On the other hand, the second line is absolutely true...because in that year we have 'done so much'...and the reason we have achieved 'so much' is because we have all pulled together and worked as a team. I've often quoted to folks when conducting training and encouraging teamwork...there is no 'I' in team, meaning, it's not about an individual, but a team of individuals, and a team of individuals all pulling together in the same direction can achieve so much more.

I've been reflecting over some of the highlights of this past year, and they include the following:

- It's been great to see some former members returning to church.
- It's been a Godsend to welcome 15 new members both by transfer and by profession of faith.
- Another Godsend has been the rebirth of a Sunday School with regular attendees, and I am so grateful to the volunteers that have come forward to join the Sunday School teaching rota, as well as to Tom who helps to prepare the weekly crafts and lessons. There is plenty of room for more volunteers, so please don't be shy.
- Each week we also welcome worshippers who are continuing to explore their faith... and this is just fabulous; there's a revival going on at Dalserf, and hopefully this is being noted by Presbytery decision-makers.
- We've also been blessed to have weddings and Baptisms over the past year and it was an honour to Baptise Stewart just after he celebrated his 80th birthday.
- Links have been re-established with Dalserf Primary and we had a wonderful time at Christmas welcoming them to Dalserf to host their Christmas Service, and by the time this magazine goes out, they will have been back in church for Easter.
- Hopefully, Netherburn Primary will be next.
- We now livestream our weekly services which are reaching people far and wide.

- Our website is also updated daily with new postings, and we are grateful to George Price for all his help with the technical side of things.
- Our Facebook page also has wide following and our weekly jigsaws are also a hit far and wide.
- We've created a space for reflection in the garden behind Hamilton Hall and we are grateful to the Woodland Trust for their tree/bush donation, as well as to the Eco team who have been hard at work creating the space and renovating the garden and flower pots.
- We were fortunate to secure and welcome a Modatorial Visitation from our current Moderator of the General Assembly, Rt Rev Sally Foster-Fulton and her husband Rev Stewart Fulton who both thoroughly enjoyed their visit.
- We hosted a 'fun' worship service from our Eco Chaplain, David Coleman, with his collection of soft toys.
- We had an amazing summer with our Saturday Teas, which allowed us to raise enough funds to disburse over £6k to local charities AND from those Saturdays, we have been able to welcome new worshippers with us each week.
- We've also welcomed Kieran our new organist and re-established a church choir...
- And, I cannot fail to mention the Adult Nativity at Christmas.

I am sure there are more things to mention, but these are just some of the highlights.

I am so grateful for all the work that everyone puts in, whether it's in a specific role or not, or it's providing hospitality each week after the church service, whether it's baking or creating things to sell for church funds...the list goes on and on...but it's teamwork that achieves, because we are all cogs in the big Dalserf wheel and we all have a part to play.

One of the other highlights for me personally, has been the welcome I've received at our Girls Brigade. Our officers work so hard with the girls and give so much of their free time preparing lessons, games, crafts, as well as teaching new songs each week. I love it – it's great fun to be with them. I was never in Girls Brigade, having gone through the Brownie-Guide-Guider route, so I was honoured to be made Chaplain. So, I'd like to thank the officers for all they do…it's amazing.

I am also grateful for all the work and decision-making that the Session do on behalf of the congregation. Dalserf is so blessed to have such a beautiful setting in which to worship each week. Happy Birthday


Fiona Anderson, our minister, celebrating a special Birthday with husband Tom. Congratulations from Dalserf congregation and our very best wishes for the future!

And what is the most shocking part of this months article. one child has broccoli in one of their answers!


In the first photograph the five girls are Aria top, Callie left, Lola right and Sunny bottom who is holding Bailey, who has grown a bit since the photo was taken!






Dalserf Kids' Zone

"What things?" Jesus asked.


"The things about Jesus of Nazareth, and how our chief priests and leaders handed him over to be crucified," said one of the disciples.

"Stay with us! It is almost evening, and it is getting dark," the disciples shouted.


So Jesus came back to stay with them. They sat down for a meal, and Jesus took bread, blessed and broke it, and gave it to the disciples.


At that moment, their eyes were opened, and they recognized Jesus for the first time. Then He vanished from their sight.
