Pastoral Letter





Greeting from my desk, now that Tom and I are back after a wonderful time in Venice. Some of you might consider it a bit of a busman's holiday, but while we were there, we visited quite a few churches. I love looking around old churches taking in the sounds, the smells, and the history, and while some were very ornate and splendid, particularly the San Marco Basilica, none of them matched up to Dalserf...but perhaps I am biased?

Like most churches, the Venetian churches and cathedrals were obviously treasured by their members, and the state took great care of them, although I'm sure the entry fee somewhat helped. The decoration was elaborate and indeed often extravagant, with many of the murals designed to tell the stories of the Bible to a people unable to read. We did witness services taking place and areas sectioned off for private prayer and the solemnity was clear.

However, there was no real sense of joy and fellowship in the way we have in here in Dalserf. We too may worship in an ancient church, a historical church, but it's not a museum...it's a place of faith and community. I'm sure when people visit Dalserf and see inside the church when it's empty might see it as a beautiful historical monument... but if they were to walk in on a Sunday morning with the choir practising and the church filling up with our members, they would experience a completely different feeling about the place. Suddenly, it's a meeting place of believers, a family, and the Church is no longer a building. Then as we worship, we are a brought together by God as His children. No matter our age, our infirmities, our worries, or our joys we are God's children coming together to honour Him.

As our numbers have increased over this last year the sense of community is stronger... but it's not something that we should take for granted. It's still just as easy to be alone in a large group, so please make sure that everyone is included. Go out of your way to get to know people in the church. Talk to people you don't know. Move out of your comfort zone and sit in a different seat...sit on a different side of the church and see how it looks from there.

I recognise that the magazine article: 'What's Your Favourite Biscuit?' is seen as being a bit of fun, but it equally has an important function, as it helps us to get to know people a little bit better.

If you think someone is new, please say hello to them and engage with them. Remember first impressions are exceptionally important. Recently, we have raised our church profile in the media - we have a new posting on the website 'Find a Church,' and we are also now on 'Visit Scotland.' As churches close, fellow Christians will be looking for other places to worship, so make sure they see Dalserf as a place they are welcomed and can feel at home.

It is difficult to change church, what you are familiar with is lost, where you were part of community, you are now alone. So, it's important that people are made to feel welcomed and integrated as part of our community.



Pastoral Letter



In Pauls' letter to the church in Rome, he reminds the people that it is only through grace that we are part of Christ's church, so therefore we must be willing to accept others.

I hope like me you felt blessed over the Easter period. It was such a busy time, but a special time.

Having Dalserf Primary School back in the Church for their Easter service was such a blessing, and I was grateful for the assistance of twelve older pupils who were willing to read Scripture, as we shared the Easter story from Palm Sunday to the empty tomb. All four classes also participated singing an Easter or Springtime song.

The Maundy Thursday communion service outside in the Reflection Garden for the first time was really special, and despite the Biblical rain we had experienced earlier in the day, it turned out to be a lovely evening.

Whilst the Good Friday service was emotional and poignant, our Easter Sunday service with the Sunday School children enacting the story was a little bit different!

We also welcomed Vicky McIntosh into membership at Dalserf on Easter Day when she professed her faith. It was especially emotional as it was done in the presence of her daughter, Annette, who had travelled up from England.

Congratulations to Karyn and Ellie for each gaining their Gold Duke of Edinburgh Award...what an achievement, and I'm sure the girls will be excited to meet HRH the Duke himself at Holyrood Palace.

Thanks to Rose McGregor and the other members of the Arietta Ladies' Choir, led by Janet Young, for entertaining us on Saturday 6th April. The songs from the musicals were loved by the audience and I particularly enjoyed the Elvis number to finish. The Dalserf hospitality and baking completed a great afternoon, so a big thanks to all who helped.

This month sees the return of the General Assembly meeting in Edinburgh. I am pleased to be attending this year, especially to witness the Rev Dr Shaw Paterson installed as overall Moderator. When I was training for ministry, I was with Shaw for my first placement, but as his linked charge entered a 4-way union while I was there, resulting in three places of worship, I stayed on a further six months to help out. Then after placements in Motherwell, East Kilbride, and ordination, I returned to Strathaven, Glassford and Chapelton as Shaw's Assistant Minister, for three years, before coming to Dalserf.

HRH Prince Edward, Duke of Edinburgh, is the King's commissioner to the Assembly this year...so if I get the opportunity to speak to him, I'll extend an invitation for him and Duchess Sophie to come and pay us a visit at Dalserf...so bakers...get baking!





Eco Congregation

We were delighted to discover that we achieved our Eco-Congregation Scotland Silver Award.

We obviously impressed the assessors with the work and dedication of the congregation.

"It was clear to them that you had easily achieved a Bronze award and they felt that you had achieved a Silver level, with the work you have undertaken in the six months since your application was submitted."

In particular the assessors highlighted the following:

- The commitment of your locum minister, Fiona Anderson to environmental matters and linking it regularly with the spiritual life of the church and raises issues of environmental justice. There is strong pastoral support from locum minister and Kirk Session. Aspects of eco work are incorporated into services regularly and natural materials are used as part of worship both inside and outside the church and its buildings.
- We appreciated the use of AV and FB to reach a wider congregation and were particularly impressed with the weekly jigida puzzle with a spiritual message on completion. Their Facebook page is looked at by many people within and out with the congregation and from across the world. This is updated each day so is kept relevant and vibrant.
- Your inclusion of so many volunteers (for a small congregation) within your projects and reaching out to the wider community. The clear communication of eco-matters in your magazine and displayed in halls with recycling table.
- The work of your garden team. Great use has been made of church grounds to encourage wildlife and also to use for teaching about wildlife. The reflection garden and graveyard lookout provide a peaceful space for contemplation and being at one with nature.

Achieving the Silver Award is something that few churches in Forth Valley and Clydesdale Presbytery have accomplished so we have had positive publicity in the press and through the Church of Scotland Facebook page.


It would be good to encourage other churches to do this so we will try and organise an event to promote Eco -congregation awards.

Sheena and I spend much time walking in the countryside, and we marvel at "nature" as the days, weeks and months pass by. Now that we are fully into Spring and early Summer we have enjoyed the newly emerging wild flowers as well as the spring bulbs. We remain fascinated each year with the amazing number of new lambs born in South Lanarkshire. We love to stop in some quiet backwater and watch them gambolling in the spring sunshine (or rain this year!!) We are fascinated as the days progress how quickly they become independent and stray from their mothers. It is not long till they gather in groups, interacting with each other, skipping and jumping and vying with each other to gain the highest spot. At times we compare them to the "Charge of the Light Brigade" as they take flight in unison down a hillside or embankment.

In a wider context I am amazed how humans "drool" over anything "newborn". Be it a puppy, a kitten, a pony, a rabbit, a duckling, a signet swan or even a baby elephant. I have often noticed, how, even the "toughest" of men will stop for a second and look into a pram at the side of the pavement. His countenance often softens and he invariably nods, winks or waves to the child inside. I put this phenomenon down to humans being aware, in the very depths of their souls, that at that very moment in time they are in the presence of a "miracle". I am reminded of the biblical verse of God breathing into the nostrils of Adam and giving him life.

New life is part of the foundation of my faith. I regard new life as a "miracle". We, including the very young, are so bombarded with the notion of "evolution" that the idea of "creation" has lost much of its meaning to the general public. The word "evolution" indicates that something has developed step by step from something else. "Something" does not "evolve" out of "nothing". There is a common idea that when the Earth was a solid rock with only rainwater present, that somehow chemicals leached from the rocks into some crevice and perhaps with a flash of lightening suddenly there was "life". It is interesting to note that no scientist, or laboratory has ever produced one living "cell" from its chemical components, despite all the computers, AI and the combined intellectual ability of the human race. No one can explain how "life" began. Scientists can alter, adjust, manipulate and change cells --- they cannot be manufactured.

The logic of a "creating intelligence" seems to me to be overwhelming. In my view "evolution" was God's greatest gift to the Earth. Through it God was able to make sure that all living creatures could adjust and change to their own particular environment. Mankind has long boasted about what it has "invented". Mankind has invented "nothing". It was all there waiting to be "discovered". We are all dependent on what God "gave" us ---- from our first gasp of air to our last dying breath.

The Lord God formed the man from the dust of the ground and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life, and the man became a living being. (Genesis 2:7)


Eric Budgell is a director of Larkhall District Volunteer Group and in the church you will see him either at the front organising communion or at the back organising the live streaming of the service.



This month we are going to hear the story of a boy for whom God had an important job. You will find this story in the Old Testament of the Bible in the First Book of Samuel Chapter 3.

Samuel did as Eli instructed. When God called again, Samuel replied, "Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening."




