Pastoral Letter





November Blessings

Psalm 27:1

"The Lord is my light and my salvation, whom shall I fear? The Lord is the stronghold of my life, of whom shall I be afraid?"

Encouraging words from the Psalmist as the days shorten, the nights get longer, and we begin to prepare to turn hearts toward the coming of Christ, and the Light of the World.

I hear lots of folks comment about how quickly this year has gone — Spring seems such a long time ago; Summer seemed to whizz past; Autumn arrived early this year, helped by the storm winds and rains causing the trees to cast their leaves; and low and behold Winter will be upon us soon...scraping the ice off the car early in October was a reminder of that, and since September, the shops and garden centres have been displaying all their Christmas wares, reminding us Christmas is not too far away.

Friendship & Fellowship:

Since our last edition, we've now had our second Dove Café, and whilst we've not had any one attend from outside the church, those who have gathered each session have enjoyed each other's company. Each time we've held it, I've received 'good wish' messages from Kilbryde Hospice, wishing us well, and encouraging us to keep going.

Music to Lift The Spirit:

We also held our first evening service of the new season at the end of September with The Stonehouse Male Voice Choir entertaining us; at our October service we had the Coalburn Brass Band accompanying all our hymns; and at our forthcoming November one, we will welcome the return of the Salvation Army affiliated band, Summer Brass.

On the afternoon of Saturday 29th November at 2pm, we will be hosting a charity concert event in aid of The Beatson Cancer Charity with around 25 pupils (and teachers) from Lesmahagow High School all taking part to entertain us. Entry is free of charge, but a retiring offering will be taken and passed on to the charity. Refreshments will be available after the concert in the hall.

We also have other events coming up both this month and next, covered elsewhere in the magazine...especially The Guild Fair on 15th November.



Pastoral Letter



Love Lives On:

A Service of Remembrance Our annual Service of Remembrance will be held on 9th November at the usual time here in church. Shorter Acts of Remembrance will take place in both Netherburn at 10am and Rorison at 10.30am beside the War Memorials.

On 27th November in association with Co-Op Funeral Care Larkhall and Lesmahagow, Father Wyllie and I will be hosting an ecumenical evening service in the Co-Op Parlour: 'Love Lives On: A Service of Remembrance.' This is being held to celebrate and remember the lives of those lost perhaps in the last year, a challenging time, especially for some whom this may be the first Christmas without their loved one sitting at the Christmas dinner table. This is a really exciting venture as nothing has been done like this before in Larkhall, and I'm grateful to the Co-Op for agreeing to host this and provide refreshments; to Shannon for volunteering her services to play for the hymns; to Hazel who will sing a reflective piece; and to Thomson who has donated forget-me-not seeds to gift as people leave.

Remembering Dalserf's Past:

We recently had the privilege of spending time with the daughter of one of our former ministers. Mrs Gunn, who is now in her late 80's and lives in Gourock, is the daughter of Rev Louis Watson who ministered at Dalserf from 1937 to 1945. Mrs Gunn, although just a wee girl when the family moved on to Edinburgh, fondly remembered Dalserf and she and Bruce Archibald had a great time exchanging stories and reminiscing about the good 'old' days.

Giving Thanks in Every Season:

I started with a Psalm, and I'd like to end with another:

Psalm 100:4-5

"Enter His gates with thanksgiving and His courts with praise; give thanks to Him and praise His name. For the Lord is good and His love endures forever; His faithfulness continues through all generations."

As we thank God for the Harvest...as we reflect on the Season of Remembrance...and as we prepare and look forward to the joyous Avent and Christmas Season...may we always be grateful and enter His courts with thanksgiving, and this we can do every Sunday when we gather together at 11.30am. So, why not invite a friend and bring them along with you, so they too can give thanks and learn a wee bit more about God's love for them and the world...everyone is welcome at Dalserf!

Hymn & Bible Study:

Let the Weak Say I Am Strong & 2 Corinthians 12:9-10

"My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." 2 Corinthians 12:9 (NIV)

Paul writes these words after admitting that he struggled with weakness, something he called his "thorn in the flesh." It is not clear if this is a physical, emotional or spiritual problem for Paul. However, instead of removing it, God reminded Paul that His grace was enough and that His power shines brightest when we feel weak.

The hymn "Let the Weak Say I Am Strong" takes this truth and puts it on our lips as a declaration of faith:

"Let the weak say I am strong
Let the poor say I am rich
Let the blind say I can see
It's what the Lord has done in me."

Like Paul, the hymn doesn't deny weakness, poverty, or blindness. Instead, it looks beyond them. It invites us to trust that God can transform our lives, giving strength, spiritual riches, and vision where we lack them.

The hymn begins:

"Give thanks with a grateful heart, Give thanks to the Holy One, Give thanks because He's given Jesus Christ, His Son."

Thanksgiving is at the heart of Christian life. The poor, the weak, and the blind are not told to despair but to give thanks, not because of what they have done, but because of what God has done in Christ. Gratitude shifts our perspective from what we lack to what God provides.

What Does This Mean for Us?

In our own lives, weakness is something we often want to hide. Poverty, whether financial, emotional, or spiritual, can make us feel ashamed. And there are times when we struggle to see clearly what God is doing.

Bible Study



This hymn teaches us to turn those very moments into prayers of faith. When we are weak, we can trust that God is strong. When we feel poor, we can remember the spiritual riches we have in Christ (Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in the heavenly realms with every spiritual blessing in Christ. Ephesians 1:3). When we feel blind or uncertain, we can trust Jesus to open our eyes.

Declaring these truths together as a church strengthens our faith. It helps us to live not by sight, but by trust in the God who raises the broken and makes all things new.

Reflect & Respond

- Where have you experienced God's strength in a moment of weakness?
- What "riches" in Christ give you hope and confidence, even if you don't have much by the world's standards?
- How can thanksgiving shape the way you face challenges this week?
- · Declaring God's promises in worship will help you live them out day by day?

Prayer

Gracious God,
Thank You for Your Son, Jesus Christ.
When I am weak, You are strong.
When I feel poor, You remind me that in Christ I am rich.
When I cannot see, You open my eyes to Your truth.
Teach me to give thanks with a grateful heart,
and to trust that Your grace is always enough.
Through Jesus Christ my Lord,
Amen

Dalserf Kids' Zone "My BFF, Jonathon!" By David (as told to you!) Bible Passages 1 Samuel 16:14-23;

1 Samuel 18:1-9; and

1 Samuel 20:12-17, 42.



Hi, it's me again, David. Let me teel you, life in King Saul's palace was very different from looking after sheep! Instead of the bleating of lambs and the whisper of the wind, there were trumpets sounding, servants hurrying about, and soldiers clanking in armour. Everything felt so grand and busy compared to the quiet hills of Bethlehem.

The king often called me when he was troubled. His heart was restless, and he could not find peace. But as soon as I began to play my harp, the music filled the room like a gentle breeze across the fields. I could see the worry and fear fade from Saul's face. Sometimes he even smiled. It made me glad that God had given me this gift, not just for myself but to bring comfort to others.

After I defeated Goliath, Saul trusted me with new tasks. He sent me on missions with his soldiers, and I learned how to lead men into battle. At first, I was nervous, but I soon discovered that God was with me, not only in the quiet of the fields but also in the noise of war. The soldiers respected me, and the people sang songs about the victories God gave us.

One of the best things about palace life was meeting Jonathan, Saul's son. From the very first moment we spoke, it felt as though God had tied our hearts together in friendship. Even though he was a prince and I was just a shepherd boy, he treated me as his equal.

Jonathan showed his love for me in an amazing way. He gave me his own robe, his belt, his bow, and even his sword. These were the gifts of a prince, yet he placed them in my hands. It wasn't really about the weapons or the robe; it was about trust. It showed that Jonathan cared for me deeply, and I knew that I could trust him completely too.

We spent many hours together. We laughed, we talked about the battles we had fought, and we spoke about our hopes for the future of Israel. Sometimes, we prayed together and gave thanks for all the Lord had done. Jonathan was loyal, brave, and kind. He was more than a friend... he was like a brother.

Together, we made a promise before the Lord. We agreed that no matter what happened, we would always be faithful friends, and that our families would care for one another in years to come.

Even in the grand halls of the palace, I carried my harp with me, and I carried Jonathan's friendship in my heart. Both were gifts from God, and both reminded me that He was always with me.

David's story tells us today about how important his friendship was with Jonathan. God gives us friends, and we should make sure that we take care of them and appreciate them.


