



# "Prepared... or Surprised?"

As we rapidly approach Christmas once again, I find myself thinking about the different ways people prepare for this season. Some have their cards written in November, their tree up on the first of December, and their presents all wrapped neatly with ribbons and tags. Others...well let's just say they're still hunting for Sellotape on Christmas Eve! I used to be in the first camp, always organised well in advance... but I am not sure if it's been Tom's influence or the 'busyness' of Dalserf that has moved me strongly into the second camp now, but it's not a complaint.

But long before any of us were preparing for Christmas, there were two very different groups on the road to Bethlehem.

The Wise Men were the planners. They studied the skies, packed their supplies, and started off on a long journey following a star. They were as ready as anyone could be. And yet, for all their preparation, they were surely surprised by what they found: not a royal palace, but a humble home; not a prince clothed in gold, but a child held in his mother's arms.

Then there were the shepherds. They were not prepared at all. They were simply doing the night shift on the hillside when heavens broke into angelic song. No packing, no planning, but wow, angels singing and a message too wonderful to ignore! And with no hesitation, they left their flocks and hurried to Bethlehem. What they found surprised them too: God had come close, not to the mighty, but to the ordinary.

This Christmas, our community will have both kinds of people.

Some will be ready for Christmas weeks in advance, while others will tumble into it at the last minute. Some will be expecting joy, while others may be expecting loneliness, struggle, or stress.

But perhaps, like the wise men and the shepherds, they too might be surprised by what they find if someone invites them to church, if you invite them.

As a church, we have the privilege of holding out the same message the angels proclaimed: "Good news of great joy for all people." We have a place where people can encounter something unexpected to them, a welcome, a warmth, a hope, and the gentle presence of Christ.

# Bible & Carol Study:

Christmas Carol; Hark! the Herald Angels Sing

Bible Passage: Luke 2:8-14

Theme: God's good news of peace and the coming of the King

# The Bible Reading: Luke 2:8–14

"Now there were shepherds in the same country, keeping watch over their flock by night. And an angel of the Lord suddenly stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them; and they were sore afraid.

And the angel said unto them, 'Fear not: for, behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people.

For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord.

And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God, and saying,

"Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men.""

The shepherds were ordinary people, alert with the simple attentiveness of those who watch the flocks at night. Into that ordinary scene heaven broke with an extraordinary proclamation. The announcement was not aimed at rulers or teachers, but at those living close to the ground. This is a great reminder that God's "Good News" comes to all people, especially to the humble and overlooked.

The proclamation is both public and personal. It was announced publicly to shepherds, but its promise is for each person who hears and receives it.

The shepherds' response was immediate: they went to Bethlehem and then told others. Worship and witness belong together.

# The Hymn: Hark! the Herald Angels Sing

Charles Wesley and others shaped the words that join praise with proclamation. The carol calls us to listen ("Hark!") and to join the angels in their song of praise. Its central claims are bold: a Saviour is born; God's glory breaks into our world; and the result is peace between God and humanity.

"Peace on earth, and mercy mild, God and sinners reconciled."

This line brings out the depth of the angels' message. This is not a temporary calm or cease fire, but full reconciliation: God reaching across the breach to restore relationship. The hymn moves us from astonishment at the heavenly choir to a personal response of worship and welcome.

# Bible Study



The carol blends the joy of celebration (the angels' song) and the message (Christ is Saviour and King).

# Reflection

This passage and hymn together remind us that:

God's arrival in Christ is good news for ordinary people in ordinary places.

The peace promised at Christmas is rooted in reconciliation, so that we can have a relationship with God.

Christmas is not only a sentimental memory; but part of God's plan for us.

# Reflect & Respond

How might you, share the angels' message of "Good News" with your family, friends and neighbours, this Christmas?

# Prayer

Gracious God,

You sent your angels to bring good news to the lowly and to proclaim peace.

Open our ears so that we too hear the Good News.

Fill our hearts with wonder as we welcome our Saviour and give us courage to tell others of the joy we have received.

We ask this in Jesus' name. Amen.

# A tribute to Lieutenant Sadie Newlands

It was with great sadness that at the end of May, we learned of the passing of our dear friend and Girls' Brigade colleague Sadie Newlands. Some of you may not know the Sadie of old, so as a tribute, with Lee's permission, I am sharing my memories of "wee Sadie".

In September 1983 Sadie, Kay Blair and I were commissioned as officers in Girls' Brigade Scotland and so, 1<sup>st</sup> Dalserf Girls Brigade was born.





For the next, roughly 25 years, Sadie took the explorers section for primaries 1-3 so very much in the formative years where she nurtured and developed the girls in her section.

One of Sadie's favourite topics was road safety with a song-

At the kerb we stand and wait....

Then we look from right to left ....

Then we listen for cars and vans.....

If all is clear we march across......

For road safety.

And if the girls didn't march smartly across the imaginary road in the hall the whistle was blown and they were returned to the kerb to do it again.

I think it was probably inevitable that Sadie went on to become a traffic warden and she often told stories of the "discussion" she had with people parking on double yellows or one football manager who didn't have his car park pass with him.

Picture the scene – Sadie, who really didn't like doing the football traffic, standing at the end of the road to Douglas Park,

Sadie - "pass please"

Manager - "I'm Joe Bloggs"

Sadie - "Pass please"

Manager – "Do you not know who I am, I am Joe Bloggs the team manager"

Sadie – "And I'm Sadie Newlands the traffic warden – pass please"

Sadie was also a stickler for good manners, in fact any of Sadie's Explorers will know - "It's very rude to cough or sneeze and not to say - excuse me please".



At the time the company started, Grace Allan from 1st Stonehouse was the Divisional Commissioner and Sadie and Grace became firm friends. Sadie went on to do her camp training to be able to help Grace take the Stonehouse girls away to their annual camp at Pittenweem. Each Thursday at camp they played a game of rounders where they invited the local children to join in with Sadie and Grace having a team each. Grace was batting and Sadie fielding, each time Grace batted Sadie managed to get the ball onto the base as Grace approached and she was out. Time and again, this happened until Grace realised the bold Sadie had an extra ball in her pocket and was using that to ensure Grace was out and Sadie's team won.

Another time she was on cook duty and when one wee lass was struggling to peel potatoes and thinking she would get out the task was met with - "Darling, you don't know how to peel potatoes, Auntie Sadie will show you".

One of the girls who attended camp and is now leader in another company said "I was probably 14 or 15. Both Sadie and Grace were great fun, We loved our camp days. It's the memories of Girls Brigade that will always live on"

As we all know, Sadie's baking being legendary .....

One guild evening was a taste and try where the members had to bring their home baking which was eaten with their tea. Sadie not wanting to admit she wasn't a baker asked Tam McLean, who had the local bakers van, to make her an apple tart on her pyrex plate and burn it a wee bit at the edge to make it look homemade.

Tam obliged and Sadie presented her home made apple pie on the night, only to be asked by the Guild President for the recipe. Without pausing for breath, Sadie promised she would bring it next time. Sadie's plan was to see Tam through the week, get his recipe and present it at the next meeting. That was scuppered though as Tam the baker was admitted to hospital that week and so Sadie had to confess that actually baking wasn't her forte.

In her defence Sadie actually did a fabulous truffle so we really did underestimate her baking skil

Sadie was always up for a laugh, for a few years Dalserf church held a "Good Old Days" show taking on the same format at the television show. One year we did a small sketch based on a pantomime rehearsal.

My opening line was "I am Cinderella, I am young and beautiful" (use your imagination), to be followed by Sadie's line "And I am an old crone ....." you can just imaging the look the audience got from Sadie when they dared to laugh!

As the sketch progressed Sadie had to grant me 3 wishes and, saving it until the night of the performance, her magic wand turned out to be a toilet brush which she had dipped in water so with each wish I was soaked. I am sure it was a new loo brush she used though!

Sadie Newlands was full of character and there are many Sadie isms – from the poor dogs Kelly kitchen and Callie Corner to if mum and Sadie were out and they wanted home it was "Helen, we need to get home to let the dog out".... Whether she had a dog at that time or not.

When Lana, Sadie's granddaughter joined Explorers she was well warned (by Sadie) that at Girls' Brigade she was to be called Mrs Newlands and not Nana which of course Lana strictly adhered to! Fast forward 13 years and Lana undertook training to become a Commissioned leader in 1<sup>st</sup> Dalserf – still referring to Nana as Mrs Newlands. Sadie was one very, very proud Nana on the day Lana was Commissioned, and even more special that I was Commissioner at the time so got to carry this out in front of a beaming Sadie.



Sadie Newlands had a huge impact on the lives of so many girls who came through Girls' Brigade and we are so thankful for her service, friendship and example.

I ran from the palace that night, confused and frightened. Why was the king trying to hurt me when I had done nothing wrong? I only wanted to serve him and serve God.

But God did not leave me alone. Jonathan, my best friend, came to warn me. We met secretly in a field outside the city. I could see how bad he felt, because he knew what his father was planning on doing to me.



He said to me, "Go in peace, for we have promised to be friends with each other in the name of the Lord." We hugged, and I am not embarrassed to say that we both cried, because we didn't know if we would ever meet again. Then Jonathan turned back toward the palace, and I walked away into the hills.


"The Lord is my light and my salvation, whom shall I fear?"
