Dear Friends,

Each year, congregations across the Church of Scotland are asked to provide attendance figures for national statistics. These numbers matter. They help the wider Church understand patterns of worship, plan for the future, and reflect on where God's people are gathering. I am pleased to say that, at Dalserf, our numbers are increasing, and that is something for which we can give thanks.

However, as important as these figures are, they never tell the whole story.

Attendance is a helpful tool, but it can also become a trap if we allow numbers alone to define faithfulness or success. The Church has never been only about counting "bums on seats". From the very beginning, it has been about people being formed as disciples of Jesus Christ, growing in faith, love, service, and community.

Numbers can show momentum, but they do not measure prayer offered quietly, kindness shown faithfully, or relationships built patiently over time. They cannot capture the depth of conversations over coffee, the care shown to a neighbour, or the steady commitment of those who worship week by week and serve behind the scenes.

What truly strengthens a congregation is not occasional large gatherings, but consistent presence, people choosing, Sunday by Sunday, to worship God together, to encourage one another, and to live out their faith in daily life. Regular rhythms of worship and service shape us far more deeply than any single "big" occasion ever could.





As we record our statistics, let us do so honestly and responsibly, but without losing sight of what matters most. Our calling is not to chase growth for its own sake, but to cultivate spiritual health: to be a church where people feel welcomed, known, and nurtured in faith; where invitations are offered naturally; where care and follow-up happen thoughtfully; and where worship leads us into lives of love and service.

Let us give thanks for the signs of growth we see, while continuing to prioritise people over performance, presence over numbers, and faithfulness over flash. If we do that, we can trust that God will continue to work among us in ways that no spreadsheet could ever fully record.

With gratitude for each one of you, and for all that God is doing in and through Dalserf.

Love Divine, All Loves Excelling

A reflection on 1 Corinthians 13:4-13



As February begins and Valentine's Day approaches, we are surrounded by words and images about love. For some it is joyful and warm; for others it can feel painful or exclusionary. Charles Wesley's hymn *Love Divine, All Loves Excelling* invites us to pause and consider a deeper, stronger love, the love that comes from God.

In 1 Corinthians 13, Paul reminds the church that love is not primarily a feeling, but a way of being shaped by God. Love, he writes, is patient and kind. It does not insist on its own way. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. This is not a sentimental description; it is a demanding one. It describes a love that looks remarkably like Jesus.

Wesley begins the hymn by pointing us to the source of such love:

"Love divine, all loves excelling, joy of heaven to earth come down."

God's love does not begin with us striving harder or feeling more deeply. It begins with God giving Himself. The love Paul describes is possible only because it is first received.

Later in the hymn we pray,

"Breathe, O breathe Thy loving Spirit into every troubled breast."

Paul's words remind us that love is lived out in the ordinary struggles of life, in patience when relationships are strained, in kindness when it would be easier to withdraw, in hope when circumstances feel uncertain. For those who find Valentine's Day difficult, this passage reassures us that God's love is not dependent on romance or success but is present and active in every season of life.

Paul also tells us that love outlasts everything else. Prophecies will cease; knowledge will pass away but love never ends. Wesley echoes this eternal perspective when he looks forward to God completing His "new creation." The love we glimpse now is only the beginning of what God is bringing to fulfillment.

As we move through February, *Love Divine, All Loves Excelling* and 1 Corinthians 13 together call us to root our understanding of love not in fleeting feelings, but in God's enduring grace. We are invited to receive that love, to be shaped by it, and to let it flow through our lives — patient, kind, hopeful, and faithful.

**Reflection:**

Which aspect of love described in 1 Corinthians 13 is God inviting you to grow in this month?

We thank You for Your love, poured out for us in Jesus Christ.

Shape our hearts by that love,
that we may be patient and kind,
generous in hope,
and faithful in all we do.

Help us to live out Your love in our homes, our church, and our community,
now and always.

"When I became King!"

By David (as told to you!)

Bible Passages 2 Samuel 2:1-4

and 2 Samuel 5:1-5.



You might remember that many years earlier, when I was still a boy looking after my father's sheep, the prophet Samuel anointed me with oil and said that God had chosen me to be king one day. I didn't really understand it then. I was just a shepherd who liked playing my harp!

But God never forgot His promise.

For a long time, I served King Saul. I played music for him, I fought battles for him, and I tried my best to honour him. Even when Saul grew jealous of me and I had to hide in caves, I still wouldn't hurt him. I knew he was the king, and I trusted God to put me on the throne when the time was right.

Then one sad day, news came that King Saul had died in battle. I felt a deep mixture of sorrow and uncertainty. I didn't rejoice. Saul had once been like a father to me, and Jonathan, my best friend, had fallen too.

I asked God, "What should I do now?"

And God told me to go to the land of Judah, my home region.

When I arrived, the leaders of Judah gathered around me. They said, "David, we want you to be our king."

So they anointed me with oil, and for the first time I became a king, king of Judah. But only one part of Israel.

For seven long years the rest of the country followed one of Saul's sons. It wasn't an easy time. There were arguments and battles, and the people were divided. But I kept praying, "Lord, guide me. Make me the kind of king You want me to be."



At last, something wonderful happened. The leaders from all the tribes of Israel came to see me in Hebron. They said:

"David, we know you are the one who led our armies. God told you that you would shepherd His people. Will you be our king?"

I felt a weight lift from my shoulders. God's promise was coming true.

The elders took oil and anointed me again, right there in Hebron. And that day, at thirty years old, I became king over the whole nation of Israel.

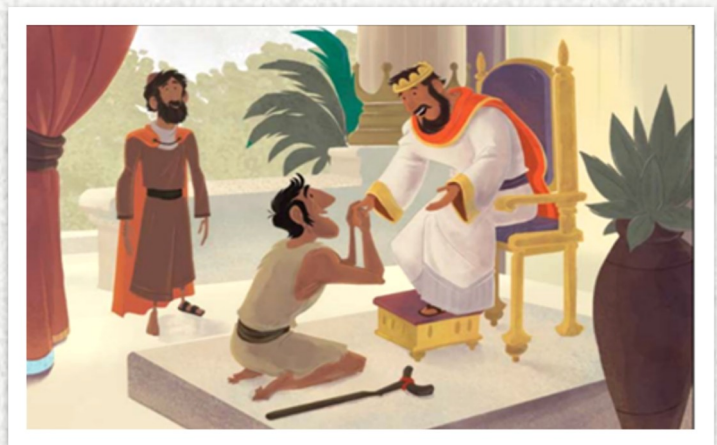
I didn't become king because I was the biggest or the strongest. I became king because God chose me and helped me every step of the way, even through the hard times.

And I learned something important:

When God has a plan for your life, no one can stop it. All you need to do is trust Him and follow where He leads.
